- 1. <u>Title of the practice :-</u> (N.S.S.) National service scheme
- 2. <u>Goal</u>:- The main motto of N.S.S. is "Not me But you", sticking to this motto our institution always tries to make the students aware regarding their social service through which they can identity the needs and problems of the community and involve themselves in problem solving process, While taking their regular education.
- 3. The Context :- In society there are several myths and misbelieves strongly rooted their foots from many decades. Through N.S.S. activities we try and create awareness in the community in scientific way, that how this myths ruins our day to day life and also our surrounding environment. Some of the challenging issues which we use to aware the society are blood donation and *Nirmalya* (used flowers and garlands of holly God and Godess) collection during idol immersion.
- 4. The practice :- Our N.S.S. unit regularly conduct programs based on various social issues, like blood donation and Nirmalya collection during idols immersion on various lakes of the city. Through which students gain skills in mobilizing community participation and develop competence required for group living and sharing of responsibilities. Through such activities students used to understand the true meaning of higher education. While performing such activities we face various problems because most of the people are uneducated and they live life with false beliefs. So through such activities we try to solve their problems in scientific ways.
- 5. Evidence of success:— Our N.S.S. unit always use to aware the students and community through scientific way e.g. students made aware that how blood donation is safe and one can donate blood by following certain rules. Our college very proudly like to says that in last 11 (eleven) years total 826 students donated blood out of which 285 were girl students through 18 blood donation camps. Our institute regularly conducts free eye check up and medical checkup camps for needy, underprivileged and socio-economically backward people of the community. In last 5 years, 6 camps were organized and total 4828 people were beneficiaries, out of which 241patients treated with free cataract surgeries and 231 free spectacles were distributed to needy people. Through environmental awareness program our volunteers every year work hard during Ganesh idol immersion festival on various lakes of the city for collection of *Nirmalya* and they try to educate the masses about hazardous effect of immersion of idols made by P.O.P. and used lowers and garlands. Our volunteer's make aware the people regarding importance of clean water, clean environment and green mother earth.
- 6. Problems Encountered and Resource required: During (used flowers and garlands of idols) collection program various social problems were encountered because this is religious issue. To solve this issue some N.G.O. and govt. organizations should come forward and tie hands with Nirmalya educational institutes like our institution to minimize such problems.

- 1. <u>Title of the practice :-</u> Adult and Continuous Extension Education Program (ACE)
- 2. <u>Goal :-</u> To uplift the social status of peoples of economically weaker section , college/ school dropouts students, the effort are being taken to bring them in main stream of society.
- 3. The context :- In our surrounding area many underprivileged and poor people are residing. Usually they are not aware about the basic medical needs/facilities, environmental and social problems. Through A.C.E. practice we try to aware the mass group of people in a scientific ways.
- 4. The practice :- Under the scheme of A.C.E. hundreds of students from the institution are enrolled to work for the adult and continuous education. They have been guided and motivated by teachers to aware illiterate people in the society. In such programs, street march, street plays and slogan contest is regularly organized. Various social, educational and cultural events are being organizes in our institution. There are many challenging issues which we use to aware the society. By educational rallies on international literacy day, also programs is organized on international ozone day and international science day.
- 5. Evidence of success: A.C.E. unit of our college always contributes through social awareness programs to educate the people. Various events are organized to draw attention of masses. International literacy day was celebrated with great zeal and enthusiasm. A rally was organized from the college covering 5 k. m. distance of the slum area of North Nagpur. More than 600 students participated with posters and handouts to encourage literacy mission. The rally made a good and fruitful impact not only on the illiterate people living in slum areas but also on the economically weaker sections. Various environmental awareness programs like essay competition on "climate change and its impact" was organized. International science day celebrated with great enthusiasm in the college to aware students and common people regarding development of science.
- 6. <u>Problems Encountered & Resource required: -</u> It is experienced that during various rally's through the slum areas people were not interested for the same so, it is very big task to create their interest in such programs for that some Government organization and N.G.O. should be involved for the success of such programs.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

Energy conservation: - posters are displayed in laboratory and corridors depicting the message for conservation of energy. Miniature Circuit Breakers are installed at the entry of each class room to control wastage of energy. Students are instructed to put off the light & fans while leaving the room.

Use of Renewable energy:- Solar based illumination systems

are installed in the college premises to ensure the maximum use of solar energy.

Water Harvesting: - Rainwater harvesting system is installed in college premises to ensure the maximum conservation of rain water.

Students are demonstrated regarding awareness of water conservation.

Plantation: - The College organizes regular plantation drive to make the college campus green and aesthetically beautiful. This year also the plantation program was organizes and plants of various species were planted at different places in the vicinity of college campus.

In addition of that college has beautiful garden having various species of ornamental and other plants with botanical importance. College garden also has green net house to maintain shade loving plants and to protect the plants during summer.

Hazardous waste management:- The microbiology department use to perform various experiments on different micro-organisms. After completion of experiments all the culture tubes, plates & flasks are autoclaved; it is the regular practice which microbiology department performs. After autoclave, they used to pour all the pathogenic and non pathogenic materials in properly dig pits. Also department of zoology use to perform various experiment on fishes, pila, leaches and earthworms etc. They used to destroy all the materials properly by digging pits and pouring the used animal into the pits.
